JAMES LAWSON, of Logan County (now in West Virginia), was the son of Anthony Lawson and was born in Northumberland, England, about 1811. The Lawson family came to the United States about 1815 and settled, about 1823, in western Virginia on the Guyandotte River. Lawson, a farmer, became surveyor of Logan County in 1838. He married Matilda Dingess by whom he had eight children. He represented Logan, Boone, and Wyoming counties in the State Convention, and voted for secession on April 4 and again on April 17. He died sometime before 1890.
