On April 6, 1948, West Virginians celebrated Army Day, a national observance honoring the United States Armed Forces.

STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT CHARLESTON

A PROCLAMATION

BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, The men and women of the American Army are gallantly demonstrating their courage, resourcefulness and valor in the cause of world liberation; and

WHEREAS, They must be sustained unto final victory in both Europe and the Pacific by the continued production on the home front of all the essential materials of war; and

WHEREAS, Congress has recognized and the President has annually proclaimed April 6 as Army Day, which has been sponsored annually by the Military Order of the World Wars:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Clarence W. Meadows, Governor of the State of West Virginia, do hereby proclaim Friday, April 6, 1945, as *Army Day*, and do call upon all the citizens of West Virginia to honor the Army on this day with a display of the flag at their places of business and at their homes, and to participate in any civilian observances which may be held in tribute to America's valiant soldiers.
