The Mine Health and Safety Academy in Beckley was dedicated on August 17, 1976.



PHILOSOPHY AND AIM

Great strides have been made in recent years in the improvement of the health and safety conditions in U. S. mines. Additional improvements must be made, however, before mining is removed from the list of high risk industries. These improvements can only come about through the establishment of effective accident prevention programs through the industry.

The National Mine Health and Safety Academy has been established to provide an effective background in mine health and safety subjects to those appointed to inspect mines, render technical assistance, and train the Nation's miners. The 6-, 12-, 24-, and 36-week resident programs, and the seminars, short courses and the continuing education courses have all been developed with one idea in mind—the improvement of the health and safety conditions in mines through education and training. This is our goal. The extent to which we are successful will be reflected in the gains made by the Nation's mines in reducing accidents and unhealthful conditions in future years.
